Citius, Altius, Fortius is Latin for

"Faster, Higher, Stronger" and may refer to:

- The Olympic motto, "Citius, Altius, Fortius",
"Faster, Higher, Stronger"
- The Journal of Olympic History, formerly *Citius, Altius, Fortius*

The Olympic motto is the hendiatriis *Citius, Altius, Fortius*, which is Latin for "Faster, Higher, Stronger".

(The Latin words are comparative adverbs, not adjectives.) The motto was proposed by Pierre de Coubertin on the creation of the International Olympic Committee in 1894. De Coubertin borrowed it from his friend Henri Didon, a Dominican priest who, amongst other things, was an athletics enthusiast. The motto was introduced in 1924 at the Olympic Games in Paris.
